Orchard Palace, Gondal

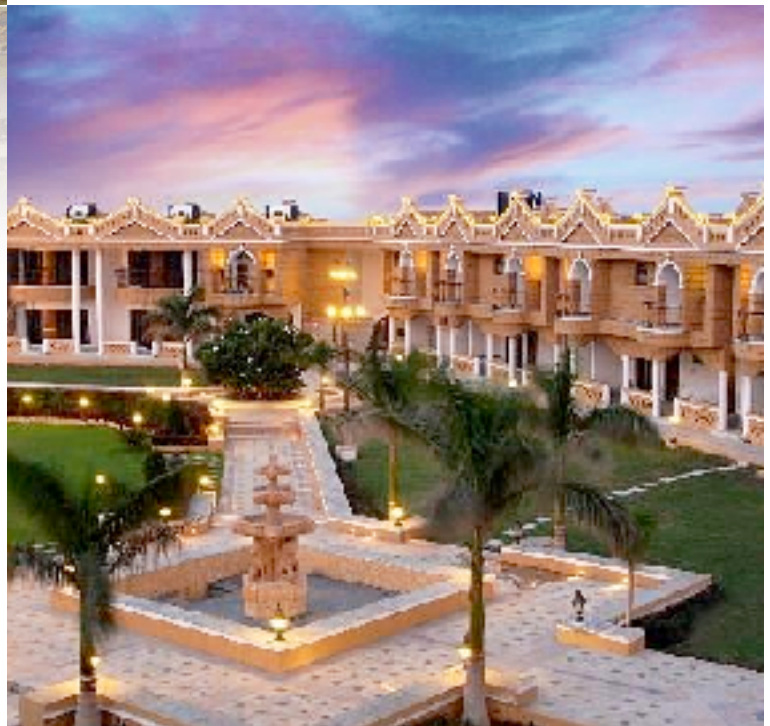

The property gets its name from the lime, chikoo and mango groves it faces to the rear. More than 80 peacocks and peahens inhabit the gardens, and a variety of other birds can be watched while walking around the grounds. One of the highlights of the palace is the Rail Saloon of the royal family of Gondal.

Khirasara Palace, Rajkot

The majestic monument of Khirasara which has witnessed the rich heritage and culture of the glorious past of Kathiawar, and has borne the brunt of centuries of history, now stands in its fullest splendor and glory, in the resplendent present.

Balaram Palace, Chitrasani

Constructed in the late 1920s, Balaram Palace was the weekend retreat and hunting resort of the Lohanis who ruled from Jalore in southwestern Rajasthan.

The palace is a gracious work of neo-classical architecture, with 13 acres of private wood-lands and formally landscaped gardens with Mexican lawns, exotic flowerbeds, modern fountains and a well-concealed music system.

Vijay Vilas Palace, Palitana

The Vijay Vilas Palace was built in 1906 AD by Yuvraj Vijay Sinhji of Palitana, a member of the same Gohil Rajput clan as the Maharajahs of Bhavnagar.

The Vijay Vilas palace once the country retreat, of the Gohil Rajputs offers a splendid view of the Shatrunjaya hill and the historic Palitana temples which are situated at close proximity. It offers a convenient base for visiting the famous temples of Palitana and an excursion of the Palitana township.

The Rajmahal Palace, Sundernagar

The Rajmahal Palace located in Wadhwan was constructed in 19th century by H. H. Balsingh Ji. The extensive campus of this mansion covers an area of 14 acres. The sprawling campus of the palace includes tennis courts, cricket pitches, lily ponds, fountains and picturesque gardens.

There is a pillared courtyard at the center of the palace which has gorgeous statues, marble fountains and furniture made of carved marble. The palace boasts of a "Darbar Hall" which displays life-size paintings of ancient rulers as well as the majestic throne. The ceiling of the Darbar Hall is painted splendidly and enthralls the visitors.

Welcome Heritage Mani Mansion

"Mani Mansion derived from name "Manibhai", who was a legendry social worker and acclaimed businessman had build this House in the year 1923. This Heritage House was once home to the entire Dalal family and it continues to resemble the magnificence of its original Eclectic architecture even today.

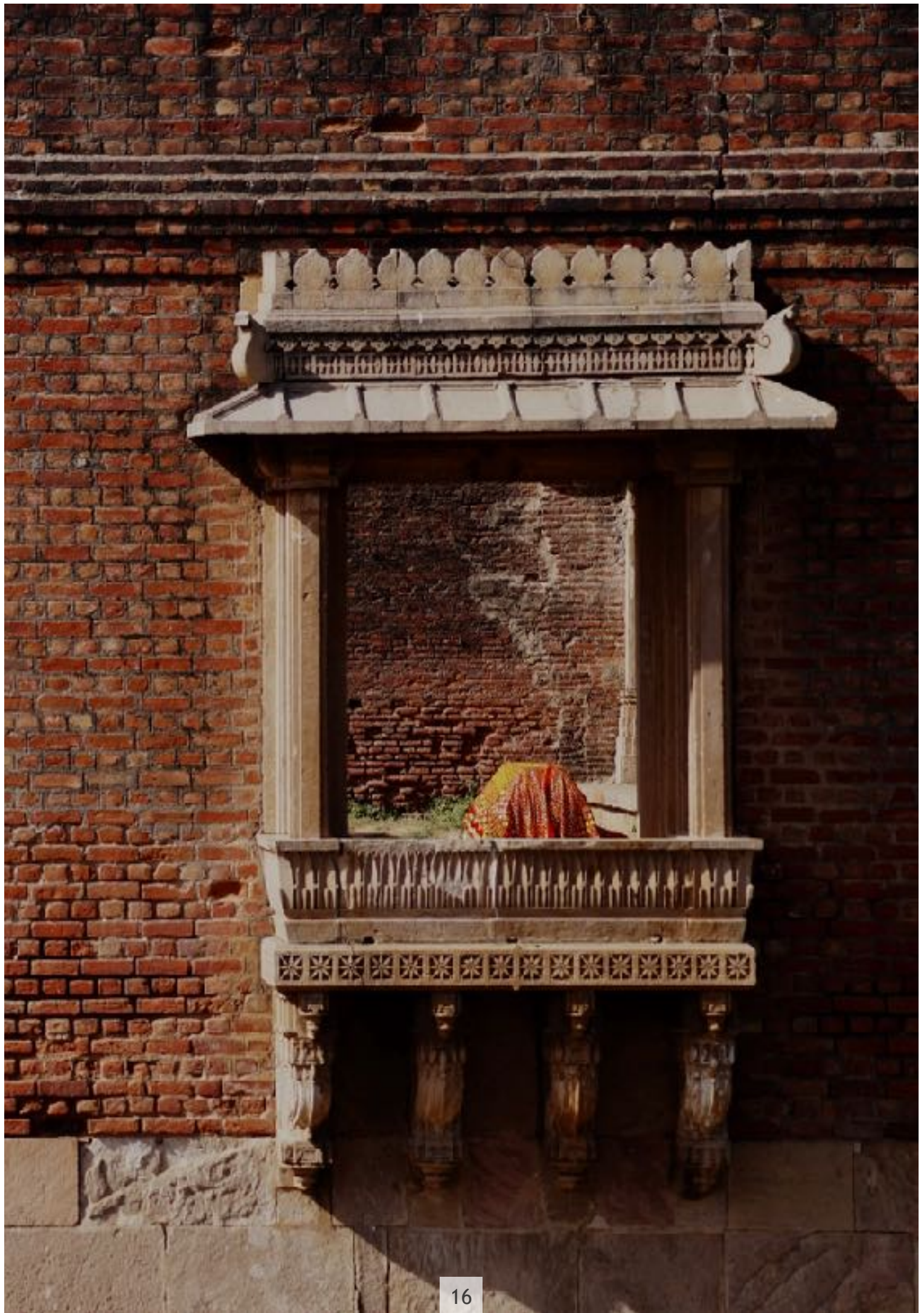
Spread in about 2300sq meter, this House had seven huge rooms on the ground floor along with verandah and a porch in this main building.

Kutch embroidery is dense with motifs, and a variation with mirrors sewn into the embroidery is one of the signature arts of this region.

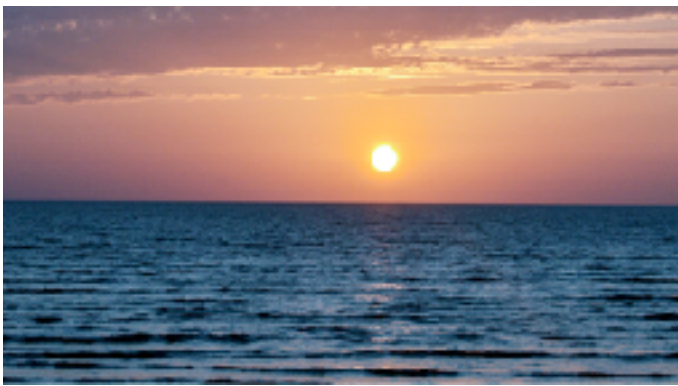


Central Zone

Patan and Mehsana, replete with architectural excellence, represent the height of North Gujarat's cultural achievements during the Golden Period of Solanki rule.



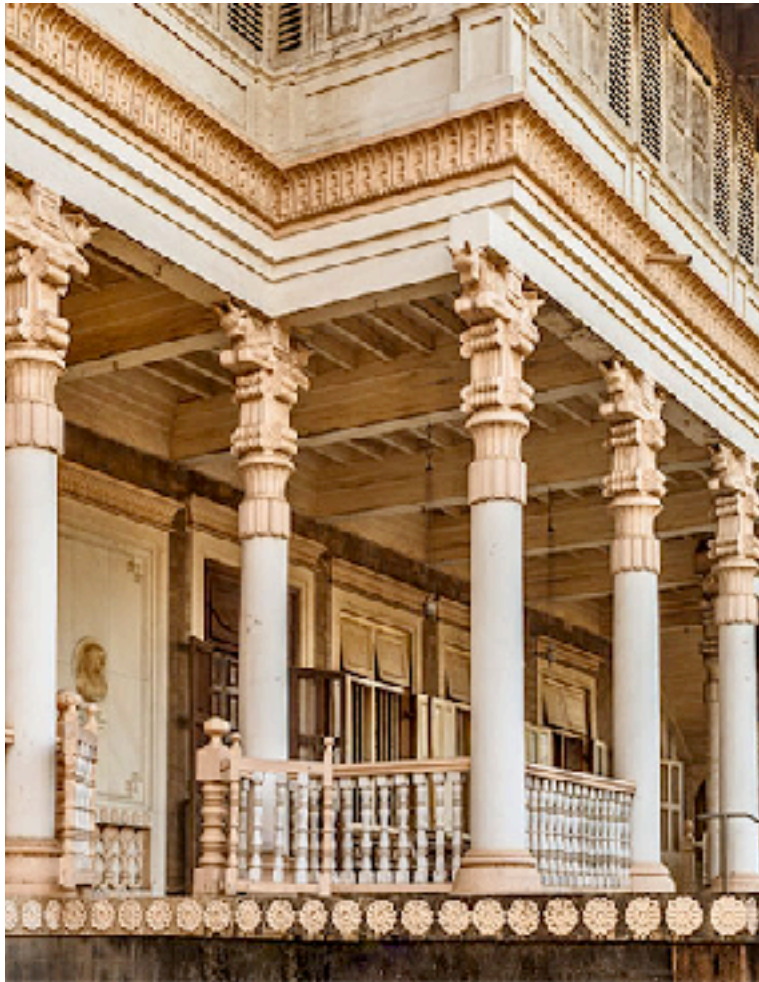
South Zone

South Zone, also known as Dakshin Gujarat (Daxin Gujarat), is a region in the Indian state of Gujarat. The region is one of the wettest regions of India. The western part is almost coastal and is known as Kantha Vistar ("coastal expanse" in Gujarati).

Saurashtra Zone

Saurashtra (region) Saurashtra, and some part of it also known as Sorath or Kathiawar, is a peninsular region of Gujarat, India, located on the Arabian Sea coast. It covers about a third of Gujarat state, notably 11 districts of Gujarat, including Rajkot District.





Valsad

Valsad is a coastal district and it derived its name from vad-saal that means hampered by banyan trees (vad). This area was full of banyan trees. Valsad is the first place where the Parsis entered before they found the Sanjan Port. Valsad is surrounded by the Arabian Sea, Navsari and Dang districts and the state of Maharashtra.

Tithal Beach, Swaminarayan Temple, Sai Baba Temple, Shantidham Temple, Parnera Fort and Tadkeshwar Mahadev Mandir are some important tourist spots of Valsad. The Tadkeshwar Temple is so named as it has no roof and the sunlight constantly touches the Shivlinga.

The temple is also famous for different kinds of Shivlingas. The Parnera Fort was made by Chatrapati Shivaji. The Parnera Hill is also famous as a fair is organised every October on this hill. Tithal Beach is famous for black sand. Valsad is also famous for Alphonso mango locally known as haafus.



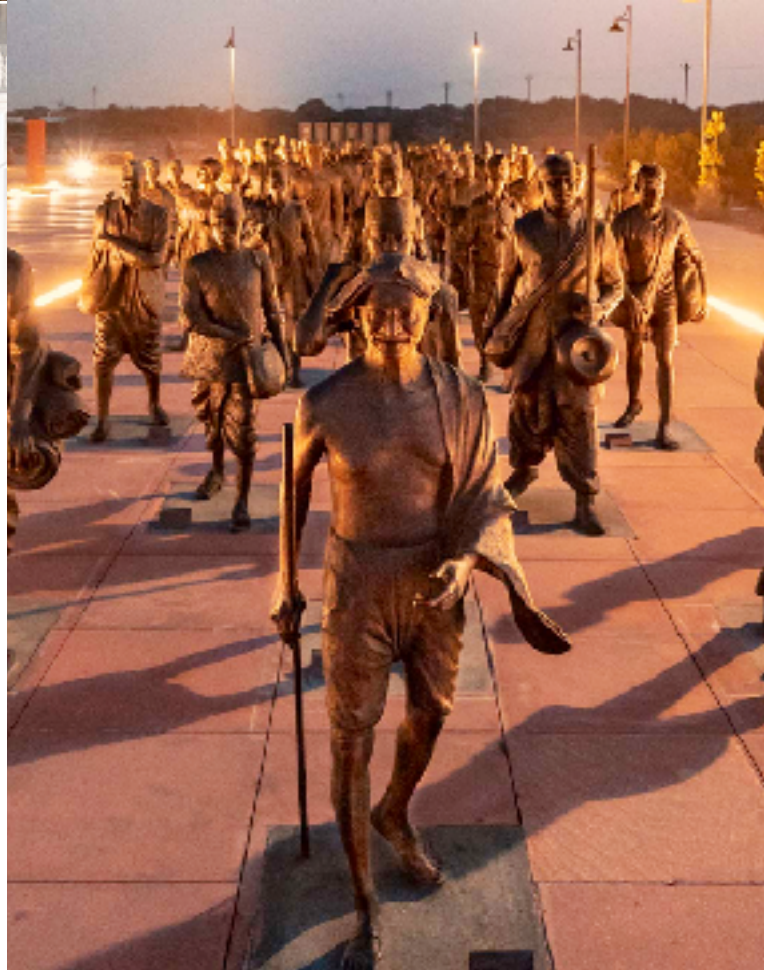
Navsari

Navsari is located in the south eastern part of Gujarat in the coastal lowland along Purna River.

Navsari abounds in sugarcane fields, chikoo plantations, and mango trees and is known for its floriculture activities and sugar business. Famous historical places, both Dandi and Vansda National Park, are located in Navsari.

The pioneer of the Indian steel industry and the founder of the House of Tatas, Mr. Jamshedji Tata was born in Navsari. The house where he was born is well preserved and recommended for a visit. Unai Hot Springs, Dandi Beach, Somnath Mahadev Temple, Shri Chintamani Parshvanath, Vansda National Park are some of the famous places in the city.

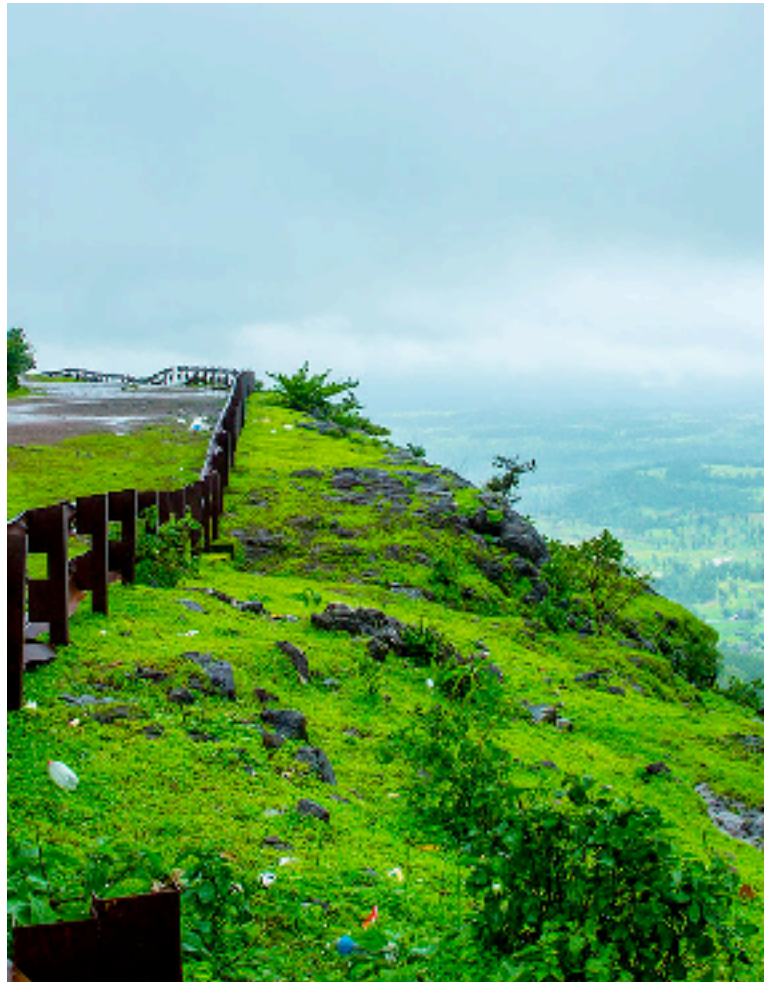
The focus sectors of Navsari are agro and food processing industries, textiles, drugs and pharmaceuticals, mineral related industries and marine based industries.



Dang

Dang is located high in the Saputara hills, adjoining the border of Maharashtra State. Dang is the home of adivasis who have lived in the forest and highlands of the Dang region from time immemorial. Shri Hanumanji is believed to have been born at Anjani Kund here. The region is famous for the pristine and scenic Saputara Hill Station.

Besides, the "Dang Darbar Fair" in Saputara hills is the major tourist attraction. The fair focuses on the interesting lifestyle of the tribal people of the Dang area.



Tapi

Tapi district is located in the Southern part of Gujarat. On 27/09/2007, revenue district of Surat was bifurcated into two new district viz. Surat district with its headquarter at Surat and Tapi district with its headquarter at Vyara.

The newly constituted Tapi district consists of five taluka viz. Vyara, Songadh, Uchchhal, Nizar and Valod. Vyara and Songadh in Tapi district are known for dense forests with a major production of bamboos. Key tourist destinations are Fort of Songadh, Gaumukh, Dosvada Dam, Hindustan Bridge, Tapi River and Ukai Dam.



Surat

'Diamond Hub of the World', 'Embroidery capital of India', 'Textile City of India' as it is proudly called; Surat is the fastest growing city in the world and a powerful magnet for fashion moguls, art lovers and diamond dealers. In the mid 15th century, Surat was one of the India's most important port cities. Despite many historical travails and battles, the city retains an intriguing medieval charm.

Historic romanticism, along with the coastal graciousness, is what makes Surat an important tourist destination in Gujarat.

One can see the footprints of the city in the epic novel, Mahabharat, as per which Lord Krishna had a brief stopover in Surat when he was going to Dwarka, from Mathura. In 990 AD, Surat was known as Suryapur, meaning the city of the sun god. By the 12th century, Parsis began to settle in the city and prevailed with dignity in this region of Gujarat.

Narmada

Narmada district is an administrative district in the state of Gujarat in India. The district headquarters are located at Rajpipla. The district is bounded by Vadodara district in the north, by Maharashtra state in the east, by Tapi district in the south and by Bharuch district in the west.

Counted among the seven holiest rivers in Hindu Religion, Narmada is a major river of Central India. It is believed that taking a plunge into this river helps the people in getting rid of their wrongdoings. There is a prominent mention of Narmada River in Mahabharata, Ramayana and Vedas.

Narmada Parikrama thus, holds an immense significance among the Hindu devotees.

Hordes of pilgrims perform a consecrated circumambulation of this river in order to get drenched in purity and spirituality. Many Sadhus and pilgrims come here on foot to perform this Parikrama.



Bharuch

Bharuch also known as Broach, is located in Gujarat at the mouth of the river Narmada. This city is located amidst Surat and Vadodra and spreads over an area of 6527 sq km. Bharuch is an industrial hub of Gujrat which is famous for its magnificent temples and its strong connection to Hindu Mythology, which is dated back to Saint Bhrigurishi and Bhagwan Parshram who was also said to be the incarnation of Lord Vishnu.

This city is also renowned for its roasted salty peanuts. Bharuch is acknowledged for the Meghraj Festival which is unique to the region and is celebrated in the month of Shravan .

Bharuch is an doing extremely good as a tourist spot of Gujrat as it is an ancient city, and has a rich historical ancestry. It is a wonderful experience to explore the historical delights of Bharuch. Bharuch is brimming with temples spread across the city.



Chhota Udepur

Nestled in Chhota Udaipur district of Gujarat state of India, Chhota Udaipur is a city offering an ideal weekend getaway option to the residents of Ahmedabad. It shares a history with Devgad Baria and Rajpipla and was amongst the three princely states of eastern Gujarat.

Also, one can walk along the Tribal Museum and Haat (tribal market) taking place every Sunday.

Take incredible opportunity to explore the simple yet interesting lifestyle of tribal villagers of India along with their rich culture and traditions.

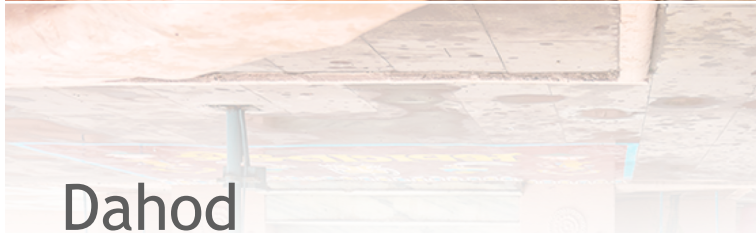


Vadodra

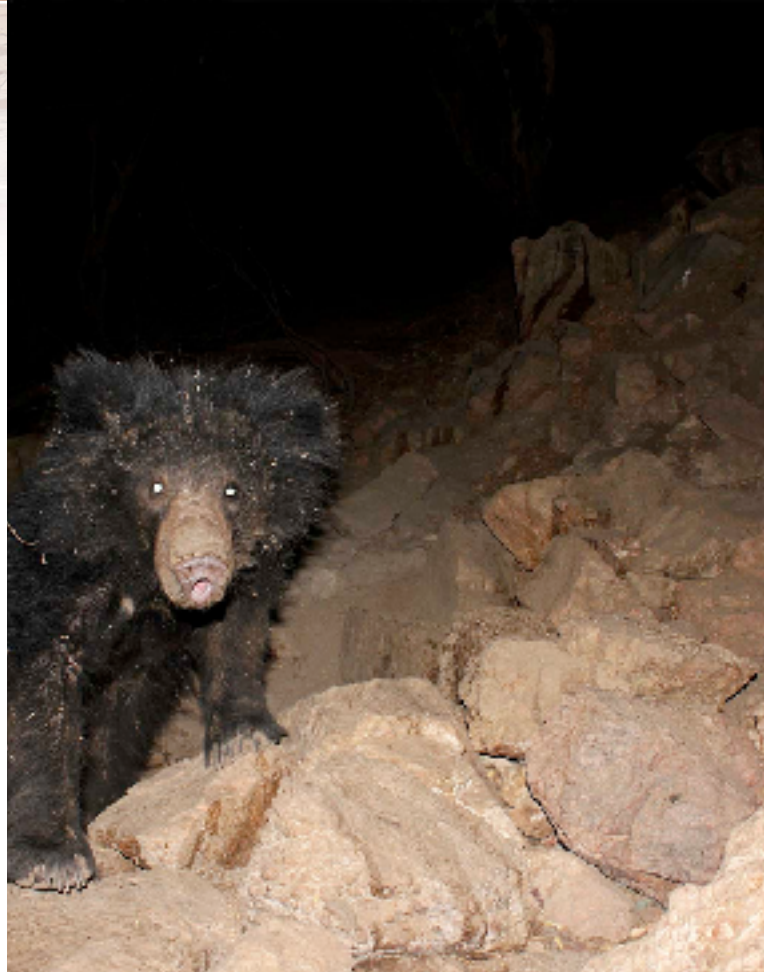


Dahod

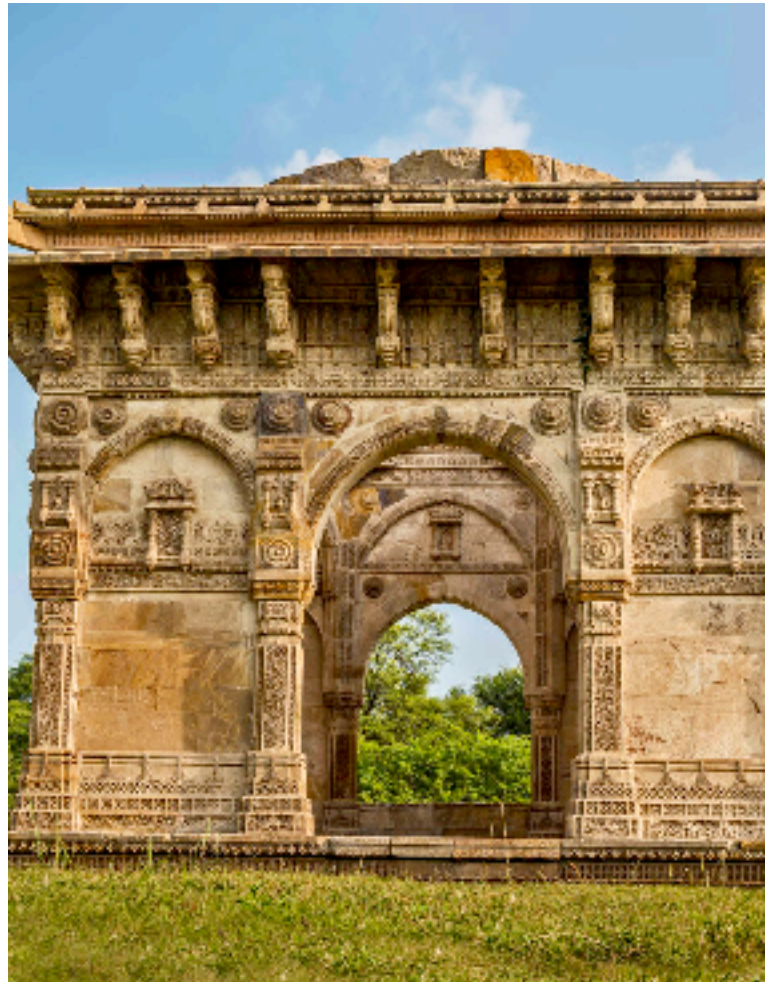


Panchmahal

Mahisagar tourist place has many beautiful places to visit to go for sightseeing with family or friends. There are also few popular tourist spots in Mahisagar which you might want to consider visiting and trying out fun with some of the breathtaking outdoor activities in Mahisagar.

The Mahi River which flows from East to West, is a holy river of India, is worshipped by many people due to lots of temples and holy places of worship along its shore. Mahisagar is the name given to it due to its vastness.




Aravalli

It is bounded by Kheda District to the north, Vadodara District to the east, Ahmedabad District to the west, and the Gulf of Khambhat to the south. Major towns are Khambhat, Tarapur, Petlad and Sojitra.

Anand is 101 km from the state capital of Gandhinagar and lies in between Vadodara and Ahmedabad in the Western railway.

Shree Rokadia Hanumaji Temple, The Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel and Veer Vithalbhai Patel Memorial, Swami Narayan Temple are some important places to visit in Anand. 43 km north-east of Anand is the Ranchordorai Dokor Temple.

Anand is known as the Milk Capital of India.



Kheda

Long ago Kheda was known as “Hidimba Van” because it is believed that Bhimsen of Mahabharata had killed a demon to marry Hidimba at this place. Kheda was initially ruled by the Babi Dynasty but later taken over by the Marathas and successively by the British.

Kheda is historically important as Gandhiji started his Satyagraha from here. Kheda was famine stricken, and the British was not exempting the taxes of the villagers. In such a situation Gandhiji initiated the first Satyagraha which ultimately made the British bow down to the pressure of the villagers and taxes for two consecutive years were suspended and interest amount decreased.

Kheda is also famous for 150 years old traditional murals of Gujarat that can be found on some temple walls and residential houses.



Ahmedabad

Ahmedabad, the commercial hub of Gujarat, is the seventh largest city in India. This business centre of India has attracted many trendsetters and tycoons from the highly competitive field, which makes the city highly evolving, innovative and investing.

Beyond the Ahmedabad's commercial persona, the city also boasts a vibrant cultural scene featuring the eclectic influences of its Mughal roots, colonial connections and a pool of Gujarati people. Also, Ahmedabad has many tourism places to visit like Kankaria Lake, Sabarmati Ashram, Calico Museum of Textiles, Hathee Singh Temple, Sarkhej Roza, etc.

Legends say that the city owes its foundation to Sultan Ahmed Shah. While hunting Sultan Ahmed Shah encountered a warren of rabbits on the bank of the Sabarmati river. Astonishingly, the rabbits turned fiercely on his hounds and defended their territory. Considering this as an auspicious sign, Sultan Ahmed Shah built this area as his new capital and named it after himself- Ahmedabad.



Sabarkantha

City sprawling with culture and heritage, Sabarkantha located in northern part of Gujarat experiences extreme climatic conditions. Dairying and agriculture are the prime stomach fillers for the people here.

Sabarkantha also has some important and interesting places to go around. The district headquarters Himmat Nagar is a home to historically important places. Dawlat Vilas palace and Himmat Singh fort flaunt the true flavor of the kingly grandeur. Jalaram temple, Harshidmata temple, Mahakali temple are the main shrines. Food freaks can feast on Doodhpak, Vedhmi, pani puri and dal baati.

Tourism in Sabarkantha district, Gujarat, is famed for being an excellent site for exploring the ancient past. Beautiful temples, palaces and forts stand gracefully in the district showcasing their admirable architecture and artistry. Ruins of several other structures also make the district an interesting excursion site. Many of them narrate the culture and events of the bygone era.

Mehsana

Mehsana is the glittering jewel of tourism which displays many historical monuments in its arena. Its excavation sites and historical monuments reveal that this is an ancient town of India. In eleventh century, this place flourished with ample artistic places and historical monuments under the rule of Solanki Dynasty. Those rulers were very keen on spreading wonderful architecture along with religious spirituality. Hence they constructed plethora of monuments around this region.

There are many such evidences of chronology standing tall here though many of them are demolished by foreign invaders. After independence Mehsana stayed as a part of Bombay province, but in separation of Gujarat, it became the district headquarters in this state. Mehsana tourism has flourished after this separation and now it is one of the leading tourism spots of India.

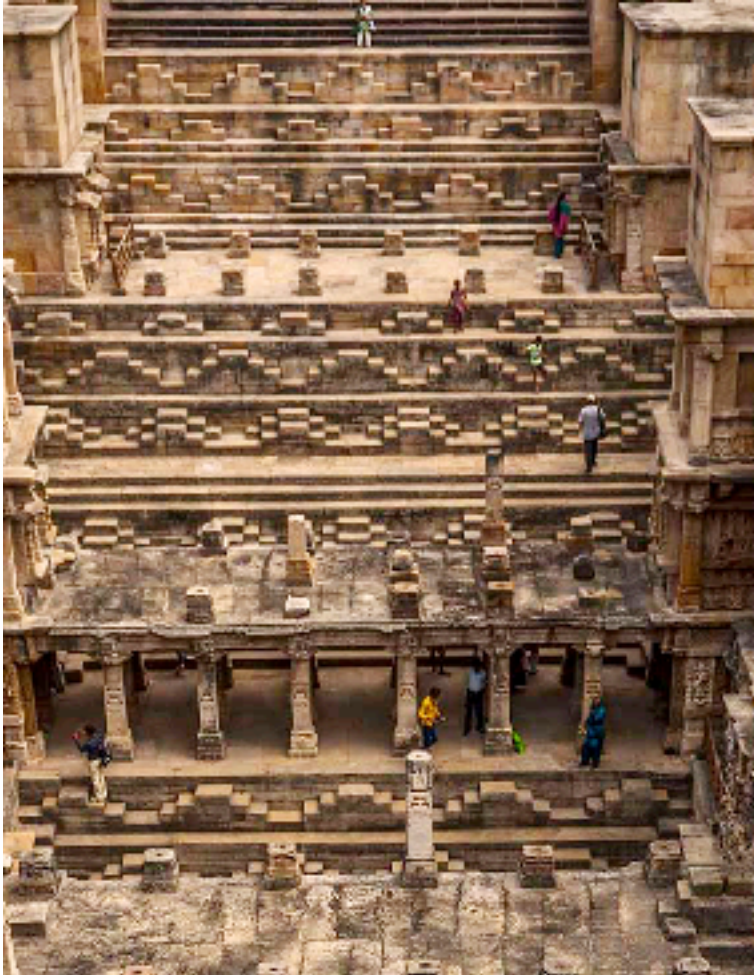
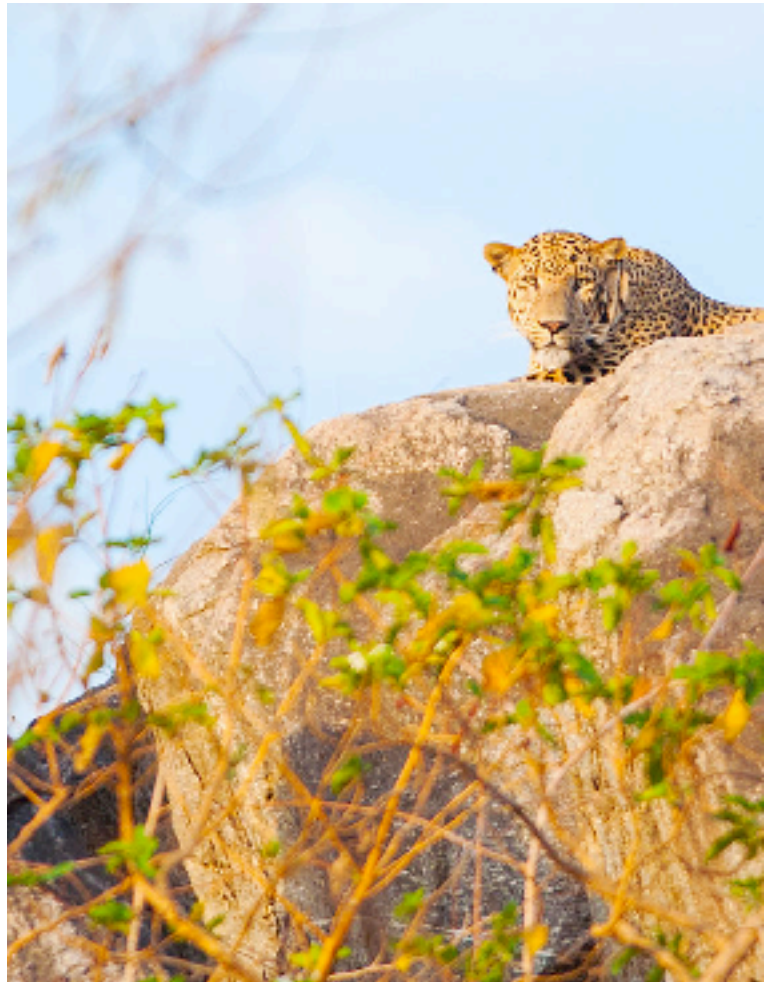


Banaskantha

It is situated around 130 km from Ahmedabad in the Indian state of Gujarat. The city extends from the latitude 23°52' in the north to longitude 72°1' in the east. The place is well connected by roads and rail to the other cities in the region.

The Patan Patola is one of the finest hand-woven textiles produced the world over. It combines the art of tying and dyeing of the warp and weft threads and their weaving together, when each warp thread is carefully placed against the corresponding colors of the weft. Also known as the double Ikat, it is woven only in Bali, Indonesia besides Patan.

As the Tropic of Cancer passes through the northern border of Gujarat, the state has an extreme climate.



Kutch

A land of colour, culture and spectacular topography, Kutch with its rustic beauty is nothing less than a pictorial wonderland. Kutch, the land of the creators, myriad colors, and infinite variety, is the place where time has left its footprints. The literal meaning of term Kutch is something which intermittently becomes wet and dry. The term 'Kutch' is also used for tortoise in Sanskrit.

A large part of the Kutch, commonly known as the Great Rann of Kutch, submerges in water during the rainy season and becomes dry during the winter season. Starting from Indus valley civilization to Rao dynasty, every ruler has gifted Kutch legacy of art and architecture.

Bhuj, Mandvi, Dholavira, Gandhidham, and Anjar are amongst the best places to visit in Kutch region that people hardly know. Narayan Sarovar, one of the five holy lakes mentioned in Shrimad Bhagvad and many other Jain and Hindu pilgrimage sights are also located here. Bhuj, the Kutchi capital of yore, get the maximum attention but there are many other places that one should know.

Surendranagar

Surendranagar forms one of the most significant part of the entire Saurashtra region of the western most state of Gujarat in India.

Surendranagar was under the control of traditional dynasties which were ruling over other regions of the Gujarat state. After the mobilization of the states the now Surendranagar district was called Jhalawad.

The history of this wonderful little town in Gujarat is that it was utilised by the colonialists as a hill station and a getaway destination from the summer heat of the plains of Gujarat during these extreme months. The dry and clean air here is said to have the capability to cure people from tuberculosis disease.

This unique and hidden underrated place of tourist attraction in Gujarat serves perfectly if you are looking to spend your vacation days away from the bustle of the city crowd.

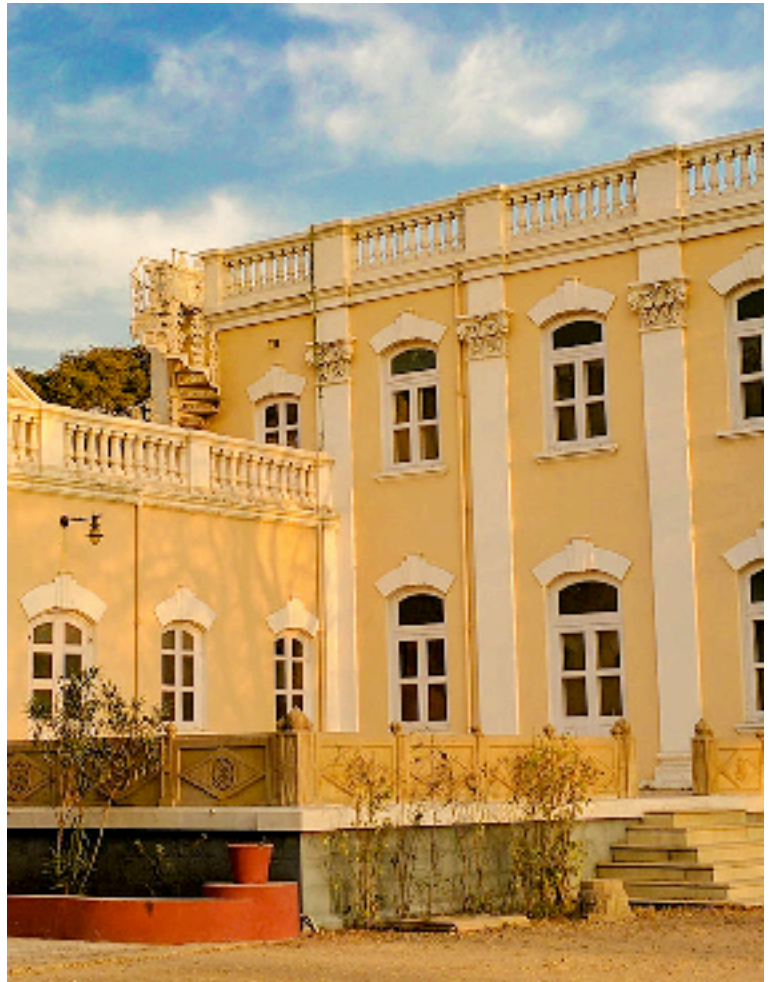


Morbi

Jamnagar

Known to the world as the Jewel of Kathiawar, Jamnagar is an offbeat tourist holiday destination in Gujarat brimming with the ornate building, pristine coastal region and picturesque lakes. Located on the coast of Gulf of Kutch, Jamnagar is the largest city on the western region of India.

In the heart of the city, there is a fort amidst the lake while the coastal area is covered with an oil refinery, which is largest in the world, beaches and spectacular Marine National Park. With exquisite Rajput architecture and pristine coastline, Jamnagar is Gujarat's lesser-known gems.

Jamnagar (former Nawanagar) came into limelight 444 years ago when it was established on the bank of Nagmatti and Rangmattiriver by the Shri Jam Raval, who is deemed as one of the heirs of Lord Krishna. A place of eternal beauty, Jamnagar is also an ornithologist's paradise. Jamnagar has a start of the art ecosystem called Khijadiya Bird Sanctuary.



Devbhoomi Dwarka

A land of different spiritual beliefs and mores, Dwarka is among the seven pious cities of India where lots of festivals are being relished every year by thousands of devotees thronging from different parts of the world. Moreover, beautiful temples and impressive cultures inspire the folks in the charming city of spiritual enlightenment.

A great religious place with much historical significance, it is tantamount with Lord Krishna and the city has achieved honors as the door to the much treasured liberation. No surprise, the place has its mention in Mahabharata and Skanda Purana. According to devout scriptures, Dwarka is one of the sacred sites that grant salvation since Lord Krishna created his earthly empire here.

Its finest temples exhibits flamboyant architecture and connection with Lord Krishna, so don't forget to pay a visit to these holy shrines offering a wholesome experience to cherish forever.

Porbandar

Nestled in between the Veraval and Dwarka, Porbandar beach lies towards the southwest coast of the state of Gujarat. It is mostly known across the country for its various tourist attractions. It has an ancient port that enhances its beauty and implication. Porbandar is the birth place of Mahatma Gandhi, the father of the nation. Other than this, this place is also believed to be the birth place of Sudama, who was a close friend and devotee of Lord Krishna. Earlier during the British rule in India, this place was a part of the opulent states. The remains of ancient seawalls and ports along the Porbandar brook certify that the city was earlier a center of marine activities.

Porbandar was earlier a flourishing trade center for centuries and merchandized with Arab, Persian and East African countries under the rule of British, Mughals and Marathas. And today there are lots of chemical and cement factories located on the outskirts of the town. The history of this place is linked with many great historical personalities.



Junagadh

Junagadh, one of the Gujarat's most inspiring and beautiful districts, is a heady mix of marvellous architecture and vibrant street life. The literal meaning of the term "Junagadh" is "old city", the city takes its name from Uparkot, an ancient fort built in the 4th century CE on a plateau at the eastern edge of the town.

Junagadh is also known as "Sorath", the name of the earlier Princely State of Junagadh. In Junagadh, one can see in inscriptions, edicts, caves, temples, forts, stepwells, tanks and canons dating back to 2nd century AD, and not to forget the Girnar Hill.

Amongst the numerous attractions in Junagadh, places like Girnar, Mahabat Maqbara, Uperkot fort, Sakkarbaug Zoological Garden, Damodar Kund and Damodarji Temple, are most favourite of the tourists. Junagadh's main attraction, however, remains the Girnar hill, located towards the east of the city.



Gir Somnath

Gir somnath district was carved out from junagadh district as one of the new seven district in August 2013. Head quarter of the district is at veraval. Gir somnath district is located in saurastra region of Gujarat and surrounded by the Arabian sea to its south.

The district is devided in to six talukas, Veraval, Una, Kodinar, Sutrapada, Talala and newly formed Gir gadhada, Gir somnath is very famous for somnath Temple, first jyotirlinga of lord shiva among the tweleve jyotirlinga of India and Gir Sanctuary, only abode to Asiatic lion.

Una is the biggest talukain Gir Sonath district in number of villages. Main tourist attractions are Pauranik Talav (Ancient Lake), Rawal Dam, Ahmedpur Mandvi Beach, Sana Cave An ancient places, Tulsishyam famous for temple of lord Krishna, Banej Temple of Mahadev in middle of Gor forest. Una is one of the "the biggest Limestone supplier" in Gujarat State.



Amreli

Amreli District is named after the city name Amreli, which is the District head quarter. Amreli District was formerly a part of Princely Vadodra State.

From the holy stone of Shilalekh of Holy Temple Nagnath at Amreli it has come to be known that Amreli was known as Amravaali in historical age.

Amreli is a confluence of vast sea coast having different types of marine biodiversity and gir forest area having the roars of gir lions, which are available nowhere in the world.

Amreli mainly dependent on Agriculture and Animal husbandry is known as part of Kathiavadi culture. Till 1949 Amreli was a prant of Vadodara state.

Bhavnagar

Bhavnagar is a tiny town that greets everybody with its richness of traditions, enlaced in the modern life. Due to its closeness to the sea, the city has always been an important centre of trade and commerce of cotton goods. Today this large provincial city has some intriguing temples, museums and also serves as a gateway to several parks and reserves including Velavadar Blackbuck National Park.

The city has associations with Mahatma Gandhi, who went to university here, and relics of his life can be seen at Gandhi Smriti in the 1895 AD Barton museum building, which also has a collection of coins, stamps, guns and other arms, sculpture and folk arts.

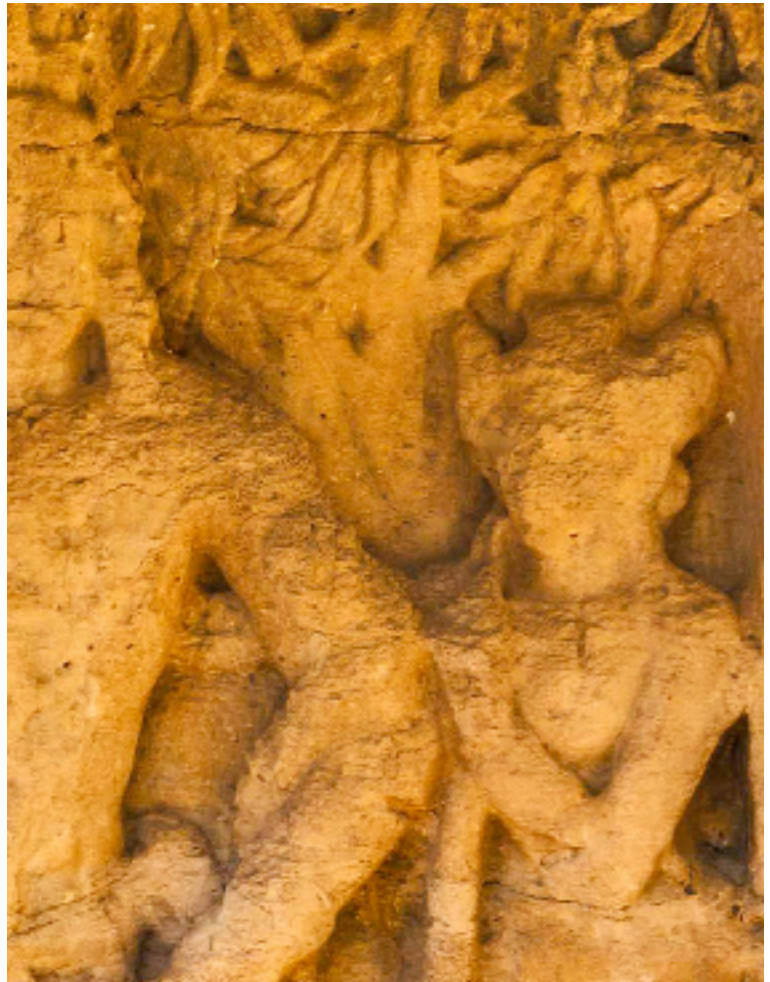
Founded in the year 1823 as the fortified capital of Bhavsinhji Gohil, Bhavnagar, today, stands as an important industrial hub of India. The Gohils had moved from Marwar and established their center at a village called Vadva which is the present Bhavnagar city.



Rajkot

The former princely capital of Saurashtra region and now an emerging tourism destination and business hub, Rajkot is the fourth largest city in Gujarat, located on the banks of Aji and Nyari Rivers. Founded in the year 1612 as the headquarters of Western India States Agency, Rajkot was earlier the administrative center for some 400 princely states in Saurashtra, Kutch, and northern Gujarat. The city also attracts tourists because of its proximity to the life of Mahatma Gandhi and best sightseeing tours which are worth a visit for every history buffs.

Rajkot is relatively a young kingdom, carved out of territories seeded and captured by Thakore Sahib Vibhoji Ajoji Jadeja, a scion of the Jamnagar Royal Family in 1620 AD. The city got its name in the memory of its co-founder Raju Sandhi. In the 1720 AD, Rajkot was seized by Masum Khan, an official ruler of the Junagadh region.



Botad

Located at a distance of 136 km from the city of Ahmedabad, Botad is known to be district headquarters of the Botad city. Initially, the city was dependant on agriculture; however, with the establishment of large-scale industries such as the diamond industry, the place is now developing with increased literacy as well.

Until 2011, the city has almost equal ratios of men and women which depicts that just the like the rest of Gujrat, this town also has educated people. Chabutaro, which is a popular bird watching site, has many species of birds. It is indeed an enthralling place to visit.

Kashtabhanjan Hanuman Temple and Baps Sri Swaminarayan Temple are also famous for their structure and are visited by many pilgrims. An interesting place that one can visit in the city is the majestic clock tower. One historical structure that marks the heritage of this place is the Pir Hamir Khan Shrine and Tomb which is visited by travelers whenever they are in the city of Botad.

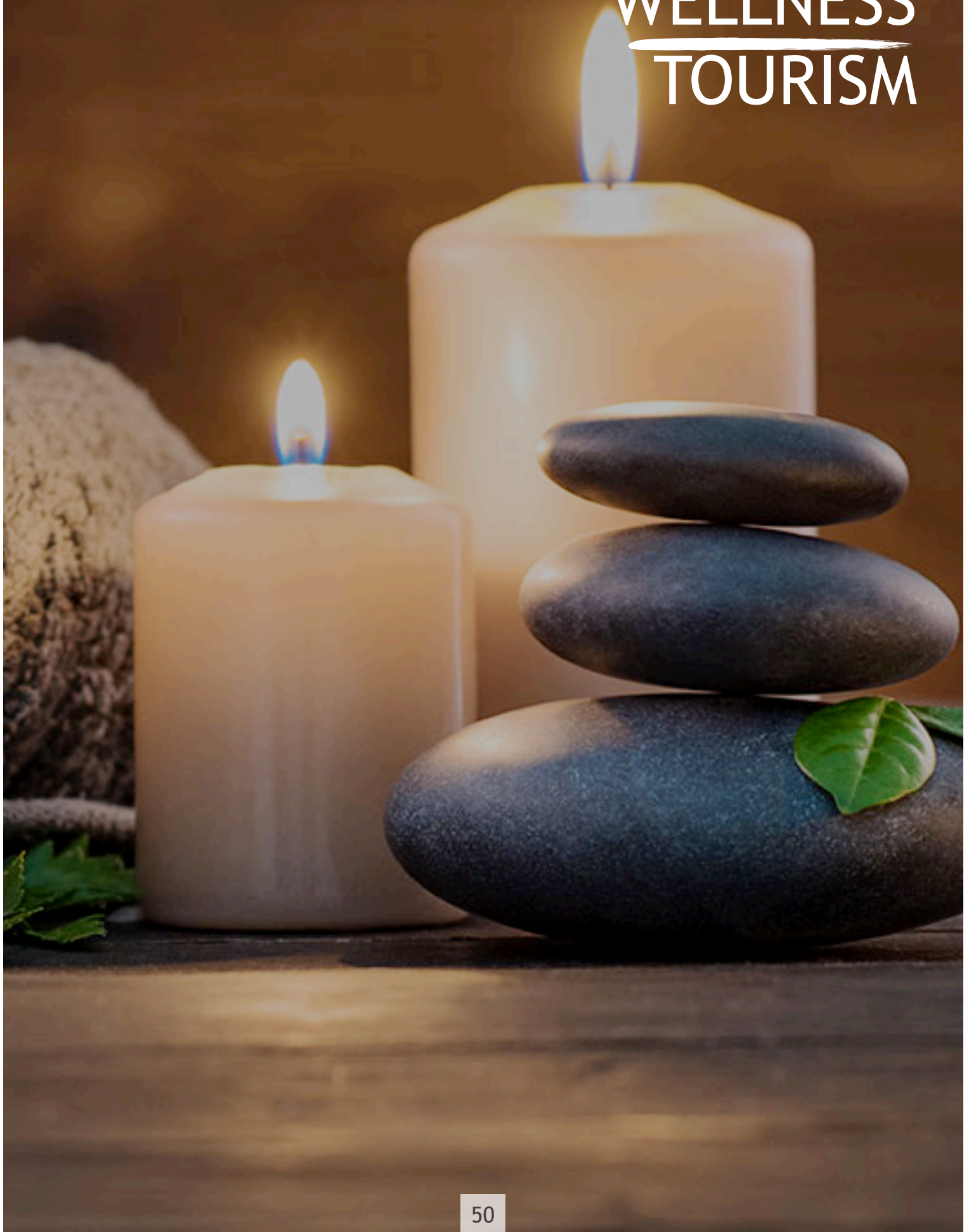

The region is divided into two parts, the Great Rann of Kutch and Little Rann of Kutch and comprises of massive deposits of salt in the desert. These deposits are known for producing a mirage, and many pilgrims have shared stories about witnessing optical illusion that seem as good as real.

The region has been so famous for its natural beauty that it was featured in numerous films in India, for example - Refugee, Magadheera, Goliyon Ki Raasleela Ram Leela, Sarainodu etc. It has also been mentioned in several books including the Booker Prize-Winning Novel, Midnight's Children, written by Salman Rushdie.



Gir National Park

Gir National Park and Wildlife Sanctuary is the only remaining home for the Asiatic Lions. Located in Talala Gir in Gujarat, the Sanctuary is a part of Kathiawar- Gir dry deciduous forests ecoregion. Gir National Park is closed from 16 June to 15 October every year and the best time for wildlife spotting is April and May.

Gir provides you with the unique experience of visiting a place which almost singularly plays a crucial and defining role in the preservation and sustaining of a certain species. The preservation of these lions was initiated by the Nawab of Junagadh when these were just about to enter the phase of extinction due to hunting.

The official count said that there were 411 lions in 2010. Also, there are roughly different 2375 species of fauna here with 38 species of mammals, over 300 species of birds, 37 species of reptiles and over 2000 species of insects. Other important wildlife forms found here are leopard, chausingha, spotted deer, hyena, sambar deer and chinkara.



Swaminarayan Temple, Ahmedabad

Located in the Kalupur area of Ahmedabad, Shri Swaminarayan Temple is a shrine dedicated to Narayan Dev.

This splendid temple was built in the year 1822 on the instructions of Swaminarayan, who was the founder of the Swaminarayan sect of Hinduism.

Embellished with vivid colours and intricate carvings, Swaminarayan temple is a marvellous example of the architecture of the nineteenth century. Inside the sanctum, the deities are decorated with ostentatious ornamentations and beautiful fabrics. The temple attracts a million people on the day after Diwali for darshan.

The personal artefacts of Swami Narayan are also preserved for safekeeping here. The temple is also quite well known for its morning 'Aarti' or prayer service. The temple complex also has a multi-storey guesthouse and a medical clinic within its compound for the convenience of the visitors.

Sabarmati Ashram, Ahmedabad

Once the residence of Mahatma Gandhi and his wife Kasturba, Sabarmati Ashram is the site where Gandhiji started the famous Dandi March from. Situated in the 5km north of Ahmedabad's centre, it is located on the tranquil and serene stretch of Sabarmati River. Also referred to as the 'Gandhi Ashram', 'Mahatma Gandhi Ashram' and most importantly, 'Satyagraha Ashram', it is believed that Mahatma Gandhi chose this site for it is located between a prison and a cemetery and a Satyagrahi is likely to end up in one of these.

In gratitude of the substantial impact Dandi march had on the Indian independence movement, the Indian government has recognised the Sabarmati Ashram as a national monument. The Mahatma Gandhi Ashram has a number of other establishments within its bounds. The most famous among them is the museum 'Gandhi Smarak Sangrahalaya' which has some of Gandhi's personal letters and photographs on display.



Kankaria Lake

Kankaria Lake is the second largest lake of Ahmedabad, formerly known as Hauz-e-Qutub. Located near the Maninagar area, the lakefront is popular for the balloon safari, zoo, toy trains and the amusement park.

The pristine lake is perfect for evening strolls with multi-coloured lights glowing all around its periphery. For adventure buffs, Kankaria Lake lays down a plethora of options like archery, gymnastics and water rides.

The most beguiling festival - Kankaria carnival is celebrated with immense vim and vigour. Kankaria Lake is a place where entertainment, culture, knowledge and talent perfectly blend with each other.



Rani ki Vav, Patan

Rani Ki Vav or 'Queen's Stepwell' is a distinctive form of water storage system located in the small town of Gujarat called Patan, on the banks of River Saraswati. Believed to be the grandest stepwell in the state of Gujarat, Rani ka Vav epitomises the peak of Maru-Gujarat architectural style. The 900-year-old structure listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site is displayed prominently in the new ₹ 100 currency note issued by the Reserve Bank of India.

In the olden days, the water of the well had medicinal properties which helped ward off diseases like viral diseases and fever. The well was excavated in the 1960s in a well-protected state as it was buried under slit for sanctuaries. In addition to this, Rani Ka Vav was an important centre for socializing among the locals as well as taking refuge from the heat. It's an excellent example of turning something functional into a piece of art.



Lothal

If you are a history buff and ever so curious to peek into the lives of the older generations, you really need to visit Lothal because this is a place that ties the past and present together. Located at a distance of around 85 kms from the city of Ahmedabad, on the banks of the ancient mythical river Saraswati (which has now dried up), Lothal is a popular Indus Valley Site and a 4500 years old city discovered in 1954.

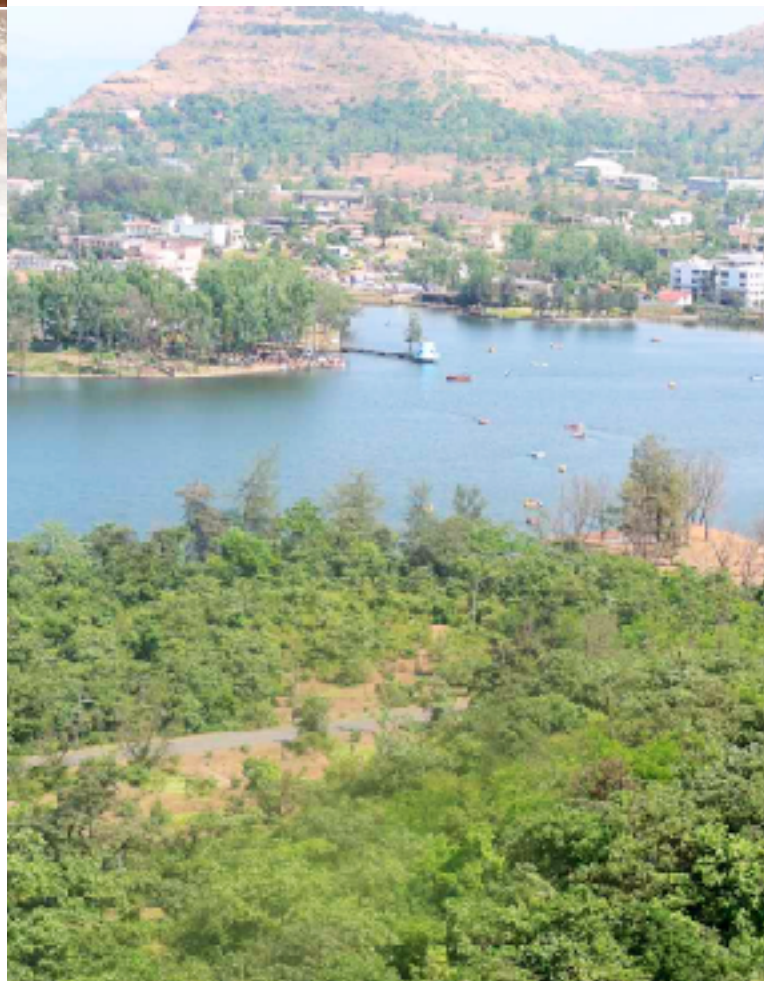
Even though the place is not as thriving as it once used to be, the magic of the ruins are enough to tell you the colourful tales about the lives of the people who were inhabitants of this place. This place is full of surprises and holds a great deal of historical significance. Lothal was not only amongst one of the early successful civilization but was also a hub of industrialisation adjoining different nations.

Due to its fascinating excavations and dramatic discovery, Lothal is popular among geologists, historians and archaeologists.

The Ropeway,

The Ropeway Cable offers a panoramic view of the entire city from an altitude of about 30 feet.

The cable cars are well suited for the physically challenged as well as the elderly. They start from the Sunset Point, and carry tourists up to the Governor's Hill and Sunrise Point.



Sabarmati Riverfront, Ahmedabad

Sabarmati Riverfront is a waterfront developed on the banks of river Sabarmati in Ahmedabad.

Started with an objective for sustainable development and environmental improvement, the place has now become a major tourist attraction owing to its lush green promenades, beautiful parks and plazas and an all-around soothing ambience.

Founded by the banks of the Sabarmati River in 1411, the city of Ahmedabad. Although the river was the local lifeline to its inhabitants, the river was prone to frequent pollution that flowed from the city as there was no defined separation between the waterbody and the town. Recurrent city flooding was also a destructive outcome of the city's location at the time.



Dandi Beach, Surat

Well known for its historical significance, Dandi in Surat is a beautiful beach destination. The scenic beauty combined with its rich history make it a favourite among all tourists visiting this place. The serene and pristine beauty of Dandi is only second to its long and illustrious history.

The sand in this beach is as far as the eyes can see and stands at a beautiful contrast against the sapphire sky.

You can sit back and relax in the lap of nature, or explore the landscape and give your inner historian some food for thought. The Dandi beach is ideal for a quiet weekend getaway, and is a must-visit when in Surat!



Girnar

Keeping up the delicate balance between the fine golden-brown sand of Gujarat's richest desert on one hand, and the lush green of the Gir Forest on the other - Girnar - a group of mountains in the Junagadh district of Gujarat are a haven for thrill seekers and religious devotees alike due to their ability to be both - a hub for religious activity and also a retreat for trekkers, because of the hills that lead up to splendid views.

An important pilgrimage site, Girnar hills are flocked daily by many devotees. While the summit of the Datar Peak is held sacred by both Hindus and Muslims, temples like the Neminath temple and the Meravasi temple are sacred to the Jain community. Another major highlight of this place is the Girnar Parikrama Festival and the Bhavnath Fair between the months of January and February every year - when Hindu and Jain devotees, gather here in huge numbers.



Vadla, Ahmedabad

Vadla is an up and coming haven for migratory birds making their way to the marshy wetlands of Gujarat, just a short drive away from Ahmedabad.

Vadla still remains relatively unknown and undiscovered in comparison to the Nal Sarovar Bird Sanctuary and is a hidden gem only known to the locals.

The scanty tourist populace and minimal interference in the natural habitat of the birds gives way to direct unfiltered access and exceptional bird watching options.

Vadla serves as a great opportunity for you to witness the natural behavioural aspects of the birds up close without infringing upon their inhabited area.

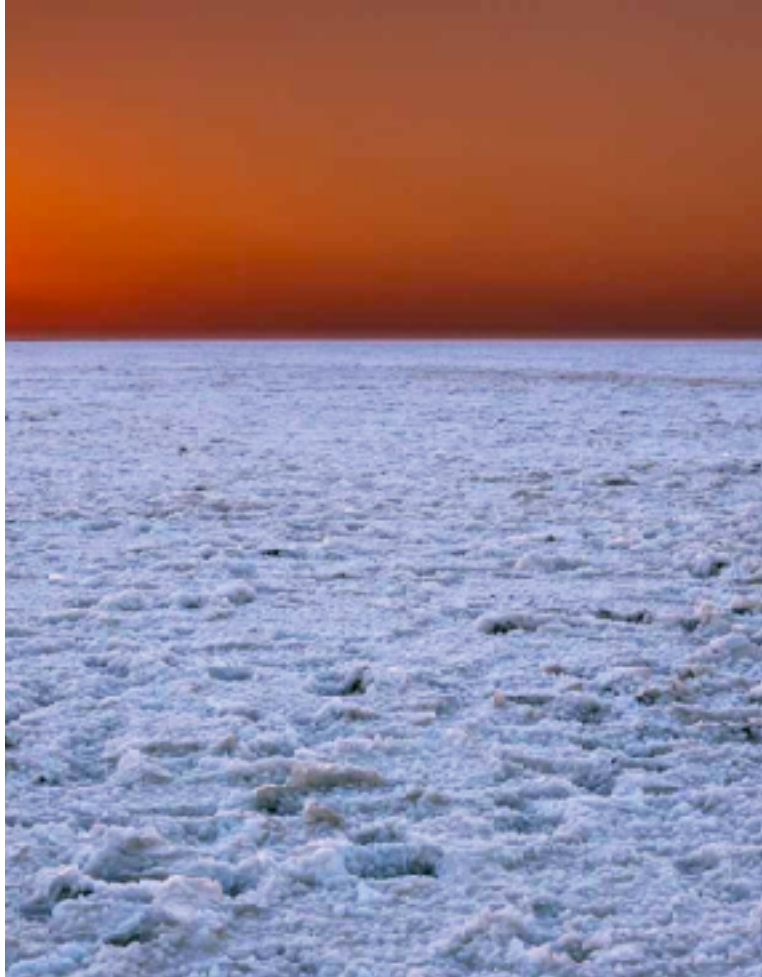


Dholavira

Known as a remarkable excavation site during the Indus Valley Civilization, Dholavira was one of the most developed cities roughly 4500 years ago. It was a flourishing Harappan site between 2650 and 1450 BCE.

Presently an archaeological site in Khadirbet of Kutch Gujarat, the village is also locally known as Kotada Timba. The location not only holds evident pieces of architecture but also of the Harappan lifestyle. Divided into three main architectural layouts, the town also had a vast open stadium.

Many remains such as earthen pots, beads, jewellery and other materials were excavated as well. The town of Dholavira had an exceptional water conservation system. Two of its most important water channels were the Mansar and the Manhar.



White Desert of Kutch

Also known as the Great Rann of Kutch, the White Desert is a vast area of pristine white salt desert often explored for its natural beauty and ecological importance. It is also called the world's largest salt desert which stretches from the mouth of River Indus to the Gulf of Kutch.

The contrasting landscape of the White Desert is one of a kind in India and draws tourists in large numbers.

Besides being a filming location for several Bollywood movies, the White Desert of Kutch is strongly scrutinised as it lies on the northern India-Pak border. The White Desert is cited with numerous sanctuaries for wildlife, floral and wetland preservation.



Kutch Desert Wildlife Sanctuary

Located 100 km away from Bhuj, the Kutch Desert Wildlife Sanctuary is one of the largest periodical saline wetlands in the world. Colloquially known as the "Flamingo City" this is the largest wildlife sanctuary with a vast expanse of about 7505.22 sq. km.

Situated in proximity to the submerged 5000-year-old Harappan civilisation of Dholavira, the Kutch Desert Wildlife Sanctuary also cites various fossils.

Excessive salt deposits here give the sanctuary a pure white surface that attracts all the more uniqueness. However, since the Kutch Desert Wildlife Sanctuary lies on the Indo-Pak border, some parts of the sanctuary are restricted to the public. There are some BSF areas as well.

Beyt Island, Dwarka

Situated around 30 km from the main town of Dwarka, Beyt Island (also called Bet Dwarka or Shankodhar) is a small island which was the main port in the region before the development of Okha.

Located at the mouth of the Gulf of Kutch, the island is enclosed by a few temples, white sand beaches and coral reefs, which is the prime reason for the tourist activity in the region. Among the several activities available at the beach to engage the tourists, the most popular ones include dolphin spotting, marine excursions, beach camping and picnics etc.

Aside from the flourishing tourism industry, the island also holds a significant mythological and religious significance. It is believed to be the home of Lord Krishna when he was the king of Dwarka. It was here where Lord Krishna exchanged the bags of rice with his friend Sudama - as the story goes. Therefore, this place is also visited by several devotees for a pilgrimage as well.



Law Garden Night Market, Ahmedabad

The Law Garden Night Market, situated at the Law Garden in Maharaja Society is a prominent night market in Ahmedabad. Housing an array of authentic stalls from Kutch and Saurashtra, the top buys here include traditional clothing, wall hangings, bandhej sarees, long colourful skirts (chaniyas) antique jewellery, traditional footwear and home decor items.

The night market is also lined with food trucks serving some delicious local dishes and street food.

It is recommended to visit between 8 and 9 PM as it is convenient to drop by the neighbouring Happy Street thereafter. Navratri is a great time to visit the Law Garden night market.



Kutch Bustard Sanctuary

Popularly known locally as the Lala Prajan Sanctuary, Kutch Bustard Sanctuary primary aim is to conserve the Great Indian Bustard. It is located in Jakhau village in Naliya Taluka, Gujarat.

Among many other different varieties of wildlife that can be found within the reserve, there are three different kinds of Bustards themselves in the sanctuary.

The sanctuary covers an area of just over 2 sq. km, but still houses some of the excellent species including harriers, common cranes, black partridges, sand grouses, Black and Grey Francolin, Spotted and Indian Sandgrouse, quails, larks, shrikes, coursers, plover, Imperial Eagle, flamingos, herons, egrets, sandpipers, etc.

Some other wild animals which are present here are wolf, caracal, desert cat, jackal, striped hyena, fox, mongoose, blue bull, chinkara, spiny-tailed lizard and various types of snakes.





Mandvi Beach, Bhuj

Situated in the Kutch region of Gujarat, Mandvi Beach is a pristine and tranquil seashore which is one of the most popular holiday destinations in the region. In addition to being a laidback beach location, Mandvi Beach is popular for its camping and water sports facilities.

Standing near the Vijay Vilas palace estate in Bhuj, Mandvi Beach is a secluded and undiscovered beach destination with clean water and beautiful view. Take a long walk along the shore as you witness the sun setting over the horizon, or go for bird spotting and discover the beauty of Kutch through its fauna.

Another activity to pursue here is camel ride, which takes you on a round of the entire property as you bobble up and down on this majestic animal's back, or practice some yoga to the tune of the gentle sea. With its tranquil surroundings being its most alluring quality, Mandvi Beach makes for an enchanting rendezvous with nature and its beauty.

Indian Wild Ass Sanctuary, Kutch

Indian Wild Ass Sanctuary is located in Little Rann of Kutch, is India's biggest wildlife sanctuary spreading over a massive 4954 square kilometre.

It is home to a wide variety of carnivores, mammals, birds. The sanctuary is best known for the endangered species of the Indian wild ass like Khur as well as the Asiatic wild ass species, Oranger.

Other kinds of mammals, reptiles, amphibians are also found in this area.



Somnath Beaches, Somnath

Along with the world-famous Somnath Temple, the Somnath Beach also forms an essential part of the itinerary of a tourist visiting Gujarat.

Travellers can unwind here after a long day of sightseeing, although, swimming is not recommended. One can also find many joggers running along a path in early mornings and evenings. Tourists can rejuvenate themselves with fresh coconut water and corn available here along with the very famous camel rides.



Porbandar Bird Sanctuary, Porbandar

This 1 kilometer square area is visited annually by migratory birds. Flamingos, Grebes, Pelicans, Ducks and geese, Avocets, Coots, Cormorants, Herons, Egrets, Bittern, Storks, Ibis, Spoonbill, Cranes, Whistling Teals, Gulls, Terns, Jacanas, Ruff, Red shanks, Indian roller and many other varieties of winged, fluffy creatures pay a visit during the winters.

Must Remember- 1.No flash or intrusive photography (for example, don't pluck leaves to 2.clear a better view; reposition the camera instead.) 3.Do not carry any music system or sound making device along with you. 4.Picking plants or insects is prohibited; do not remove anything from the park. 5.No quick or sudden movements to scare off the birds. 6.Do not try going to close to the birds. 7.No pets should accompany you. 8.No littering. Trash is only to be disposed of in proper receptacles. 9.No hunting devices or other weapons should be carried, as well as used.



Mohabbat Maqbara, Junagadh

Known as Mausoleum of Bahaduddinbhai Hasainbhai, Mahabat Maqbara is a place is a mausoleum and its unique architecture makes it one of the most important attractions of Junagarh. It houses the tombs of Mohabbat khanji and Bahaduddin Hasainbhai in the Bahaduddinhasainbhai Maqabra and it was built in the late 19th century.

This monument is a unique example of Indo-Islamic and Gothic architecture with finely designed arches, elaborate stone carvings on the walls and windows, silver-decorated portals, the winding staircases encircling its four tall minarets, the old step-well in the grounds and its onion-shaped dome. Jama Masjid is also located nearby.

Adi-kadi Vav & Navghan Kuwo,

The Adi-kadi Vav & Navghan Kuwo are the two famous stepwells located within the Uparkot Fort. While the former was built by two slave girls of the Chudasama kingdom, the latter came into being much before the Adi-kadi Vav.

The Adi-kadi Vav is a 9-layered step well from the 1400s. However, this stepwell is also attached to a tragic story. While the girls were at the task, they were unable to dig out any water. Thus, the local priest pronounced that water would surface only if Adi and Kadi, the two unmarried girls were sacrificed. Thus, this piece of history also has a tragic story.

However, the Navghan Kuwo is a relatively early well that was constructed sometime during the 1060s. One significant feature of this stepwell is its underground spiral stairway that meets the bottom where the water is found. Carved in soft stone, the Navghan Kuwo is a unique stepwell.

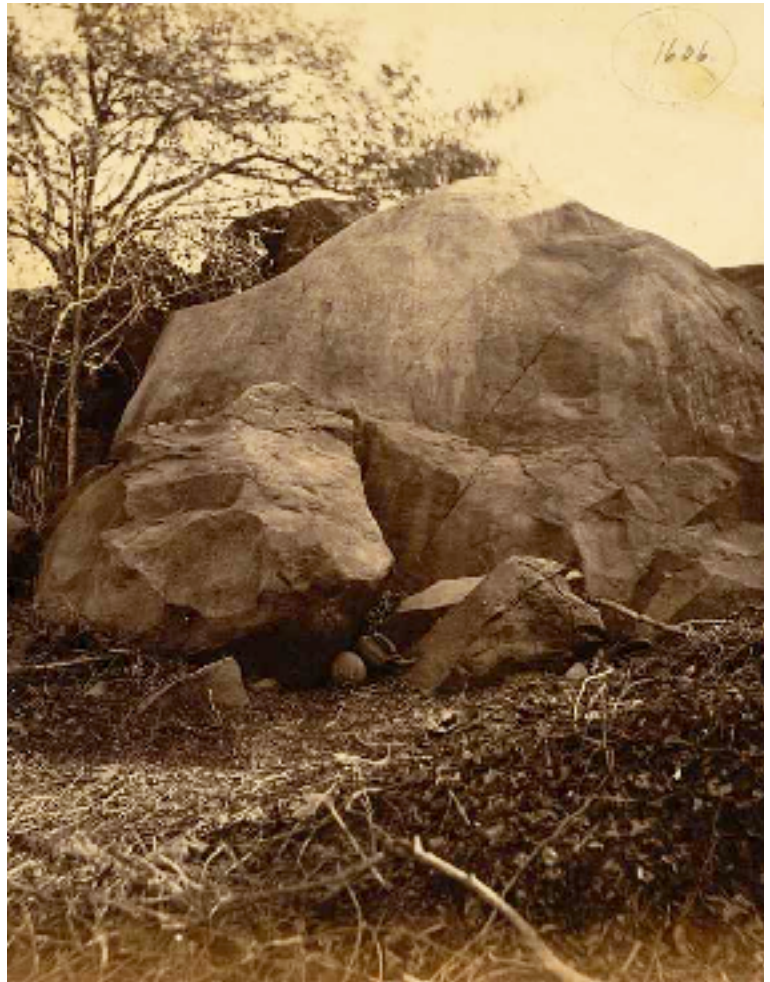


Edicts of Ashoka, Junagadh

Edict? You may be wondering what an edict is. An edict quite literally means an order or decree issued by an official authority. King Ashoka is one of the most revered figures in Indian history.

After a lifetime of war and violent pursuits, he renounced his throne and took up the virtues of Buddhism in spirit. Mindfulness, meditation, kindness, and gratitude became his new mantra, along with the renunciation of greed and animal sacrifice.

To spread this message of peace, he inscribed edicts across the region, from the coasts of India to Nepal, Pakistan, Bangladesh, and Afghanistan. One such edict is at the foot of Girnar Hill in Junagadh, Gujarat.



Buddhist Caves, Junagadh

These aren't exactly caves but rooms carved out of stones and were used as monk's head quarters. The oldest, the Khapara Kodia caves belong to 3rd-4th century AD and are plainest of all cave groups.

They were carved into living rock during the reign of Emperor Ashoka and are considered the earliest monastic settlement in the area.

Another set of caves, Baba Pyara caves lie close to the Modhimath, which has four caves in its northern group.



Laxmi Vilas Palace, Vadodara

Laxmi Vilas Palace is one of the most majestic structures in India and was the private residence of Maharaja Sayajirao Gaekwad III. Known to be the largest private dwelling of the size equivalent to four times of the Buckingham Palace, this magnificent palace is a must-visit when in Vadodara.

The striking Laxmi Vilas Palace was constructed in 1890 and took nearly twelve years to complete. Sprawling across an area of about 700 acres, it is still home to the royal family of Vadodara, the Gaekwads. It is built in the Indo-Saracenic style which is a hybrid of the Hindu, Gothic and Mughal architectural forms with the presence of domes, minarets and arches.

The Laxmi Vilas Palace incorporates several other buildings within its complex including the LVP Banquets and Conventions, Moti Baug Palace and the Maharaja Fateh Singh Museum building.



Craftsmen's Village, Gandhinagar

Set behind the Sabarmati river and popular for its Bandhani Sarees, the Craftsman Village in Gandhinagar is visited by hundreds of tourists and shoppers every day.

Sarees and dresses are hand printed and decorated with wooden printing blocks in vivacious colours. The cloths available here are carefully worked on by skilled craftsman and are quite economical too.



Artist Village,

Just a few kilometers away from Satpura lake near Nasik road lies a beautiful village which exhibits spectacular artifacts of Bamboo, clothes and many other things.

The main tribals of the village Bhil, Kunbi and warli are well known for their benevolence.

Apart from buying their beautiful art works, you can also get into workshops to create something different and get to know the artist in you and their culture even better.



Sunrise and sunset point, Saputara

Just next to Malegaon there is a spot which is known as a spot to cherish the beauty of Sunrise and is known as the Sunrise point or Valley view point.

You can enjoy the lush greenery around the spot and the cool breeze which retreats your soul and relaxes it. Similarly on the western side, we have Sunset point which gives a great view of Dang forest, filled with enormous greenery and a magnificent view as the Yellow colored sun imperceptibly strewing redness on the skyline.

There is a lot of climbing that is needed to reach to this point though and it is recommended that you carry a water bottle along. However you can also choose to get into The Ropeway, a cable car service which takes 15 minutes to reach the sunset point and gives an exquisite bird's eye view of Satpura.





Shopping in Bhuj,

Being an incredibly beautiful, picturesque and colourful city, shopping in Bhuj offers a great variety of market stuff. It consists of an excellent community of craftsmen. The items on display in bazaars include embroidered quilts, grain containers, wall hangings, glass beadwork, vegetable colour dye printing, beautiful shelves, embroidered garments, cupboards, leather articles, handicrafts, textiles, tie and dye, 'Rogan' art, woollen shawls and the list goes on.

The shopkeepers are dressed in traditional Gujarati clothes. Bhuj is the Seventh Heaven for the people obsessed with shopping. It is drenched in the colors of creativity. Bhuj is famous for embroidered and handicrafts material. From the best apparels to best accessories, you will find everything here in the bazaars of Bhuj. Being the textile hub of India, the cloth rates are 30% lesser than other states.

Banni Grassland Reseve, Bhuj

Spread across an area of 3,847 square kilometers, Banni Grassland Reseve are currently legally protected under the status as a Protected or Reserve Forest in India. It has been identified as one of the last remaining habitants of Cheetah in India by Wildlife Institute of India.

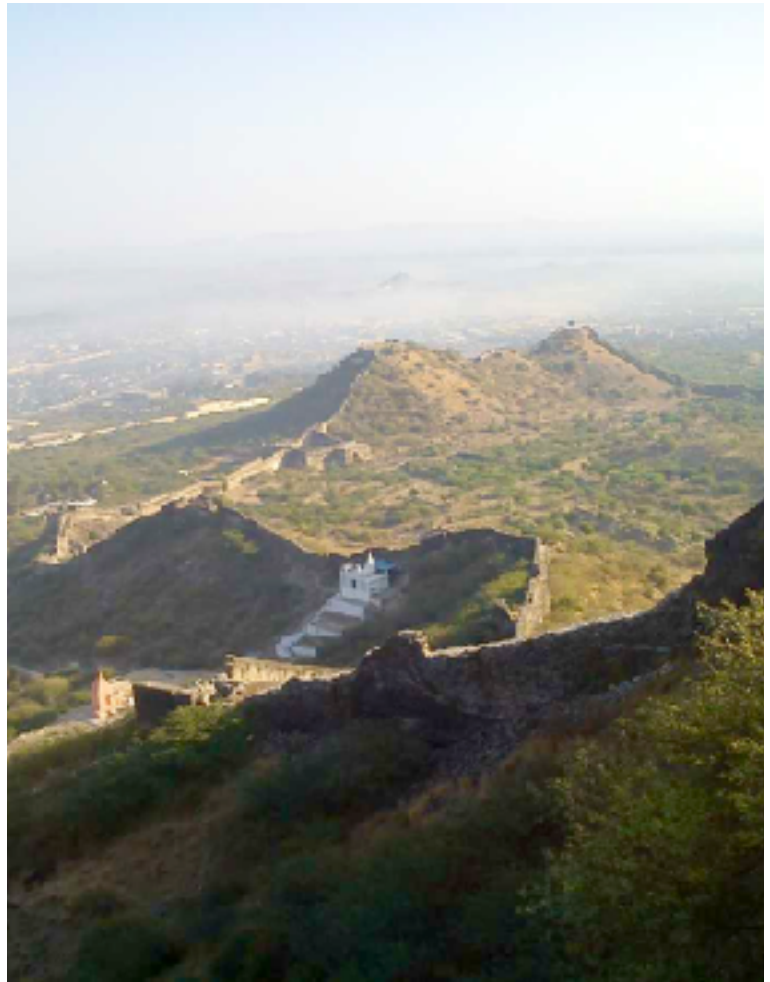
The grasslands are home to mammals such as the Nilgai (*Boselaphus tragocamelus*), Chinkara (*Gazella bennettii*), [8] Blackbuck (*Antelope cervicapra*), Wild boar (*Sus scrofa*), Golden Jackal (*Canis aureus*), Indian Hare (*Lepus nigricollis*), Indian Wolf (*Canis lupus pallipes*), Caracal (*Caracal caracal*), Asiatic Wildcat (*Felis silvestris ornata*) and Desert Fox (*Vulpes vulpes pusilla*) etc.



Bhujia Hill, Bhuj

Overlooking the beautiful town, Bhujia Hill is a prominent natural formation considered to be of immense religious and historical importance. It is often associated with the legendary victory of Bhujanga against Bheria Kumar.

It also served as a perfect location for Bhujia Fort that adds to the aesthetic appeal of the splendid Hill and defended the Jadeja Chiefs. The hill requires at least 200 stairs to reach the top.



Kutch Fossil Park,

The Kutch Fossil Park was established in 2002 by Mohan Singh Sodha, an Army Veteran and a passionate fossil collector. He solely gathered and showcased this unique historic preserve for about half a century now.

Filling about 2 whole rooms now, these fossils range from fruits and animals to gems and even a dinosaur's egg! The park also houses various other relics from the Jurassic time.

However, since it was a former personal project, this desert fossil park may not be as visually informative as other museums and may require the visitor to do their prior homework on these artefacts.

Nonetheless, the Kutch Fossil Park is an intriguing site and one of its kind in the country. The park is also a great viewpoint for the Rann of Kutch river when its full.



Naida Caves, Diu

Located outside the city wall of the Diu Fort, the Naida Caves are a group of interlinked caves constructed by the Portuguese. The caves are only a short distance away from the Diu town and they feature a big network of tunnels with square hewn steps that remain completely unexplored.

Naida Caves is one of the most underrated tourist attractions of Diu but it is as wholesome for an explorer or a history buff as for a photographer.

Naida Caves got their shape eventually after the Portuguese ruled over Diu and broke down sections of a huge rock formation that they used for construction. Interestingly, these caves were formed due to geological irregularities and natural processes over time.

Naida Caves is slowly being recognized as one of the most magnificent attractions since prehistoric times. The caves also have a natural opening that lets in sunlight, making it photogenic.

Diu Fort, Diu

Fort Diu, located on the Western coast of Indian was built by Portuguese during their colonial rule and is now under the administration of Indian government. The fort- cum - castle, is known as 'Praça de Diu' in Portuguese, is situated on the southern tip of Gujarat and is at the mouth of the Gulf of Khambhat.

The Fort of Diu is a colossal structure that occupies a prominent place on the tourist's list. The enchanting fort commands a magnificent view of the sea, and a jetty constructed on the northwestern coast is still underused and was once used to trade with Cambay, Broach and Surat in Gujarat. The lighthouse that one can climb leads to the highest point on the island and provides a spectacular view of the surrounding. Cannonballs litter the entire place, and the parapet has a fantastic array of cannons.

Along with the Basilica of Bom Jesus in Old Goa, Diu fort was listed as the seven wonders of Portugal but during their colonial rule.



Kabirvad, Surat

Kabirvad is a small island in the Bharuch district of Gujarat rumoured to be Saint Kabir's residence several hundred years ago. Located along the banks of the river Narmada, the island promises you a calm and serene abode underneath the humongous canopy of Banyan trees that Kabirvad is most prominent for.

What started as a single Banyan tree in Kabirvad has emanated into over 3000 trunks currently, with the mother tree believed to be over 600 years old, interestingly the tree populous has grown manifold to such an extent that it is impossible to distinguish the mother tree from the other trees at present.

The canopy of the Banyan trees envelops a massive area of 17,520 square metres with its perimeter extending up to 641 metres. And while the natural wonder remains the most alluring attribute about Kabirvad, the legend and local folklore around it only add to the island's mystical charm and aura.



Marine National Park

Marine National Park in the Gulf of Kutch is the first marine conservatory built in India. Crediting to its diverse range of flora and fauna, it accounts for a magnanimous natural site for India's natural resource and beauty.

The park is distributed in 42 scattered islands in an archipelago. The park also houses many endangered aquatic animals granting them protection from poachers.

The park provides with a picturesque sight with exotic birds painting the sky, colourful algae adorning the seabed, and coral ornating the reef.

A walk along the coast truly makes for an experience where one seems to be one with nature. The pleasant weather further aggravates the experience for tourists. It is advised that one should carry headgear, ample water, and sunscreen while exploring the park.

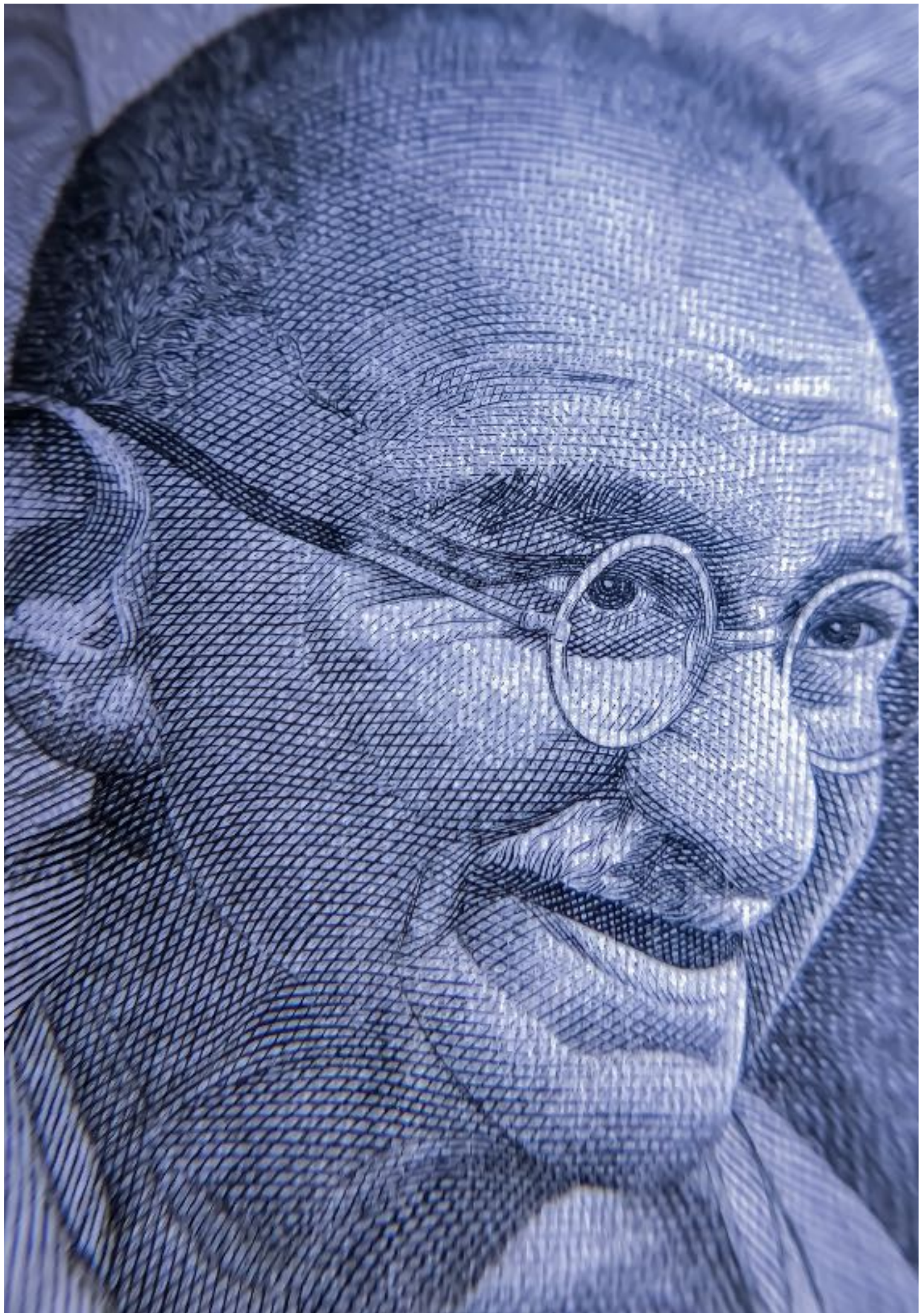
Entry

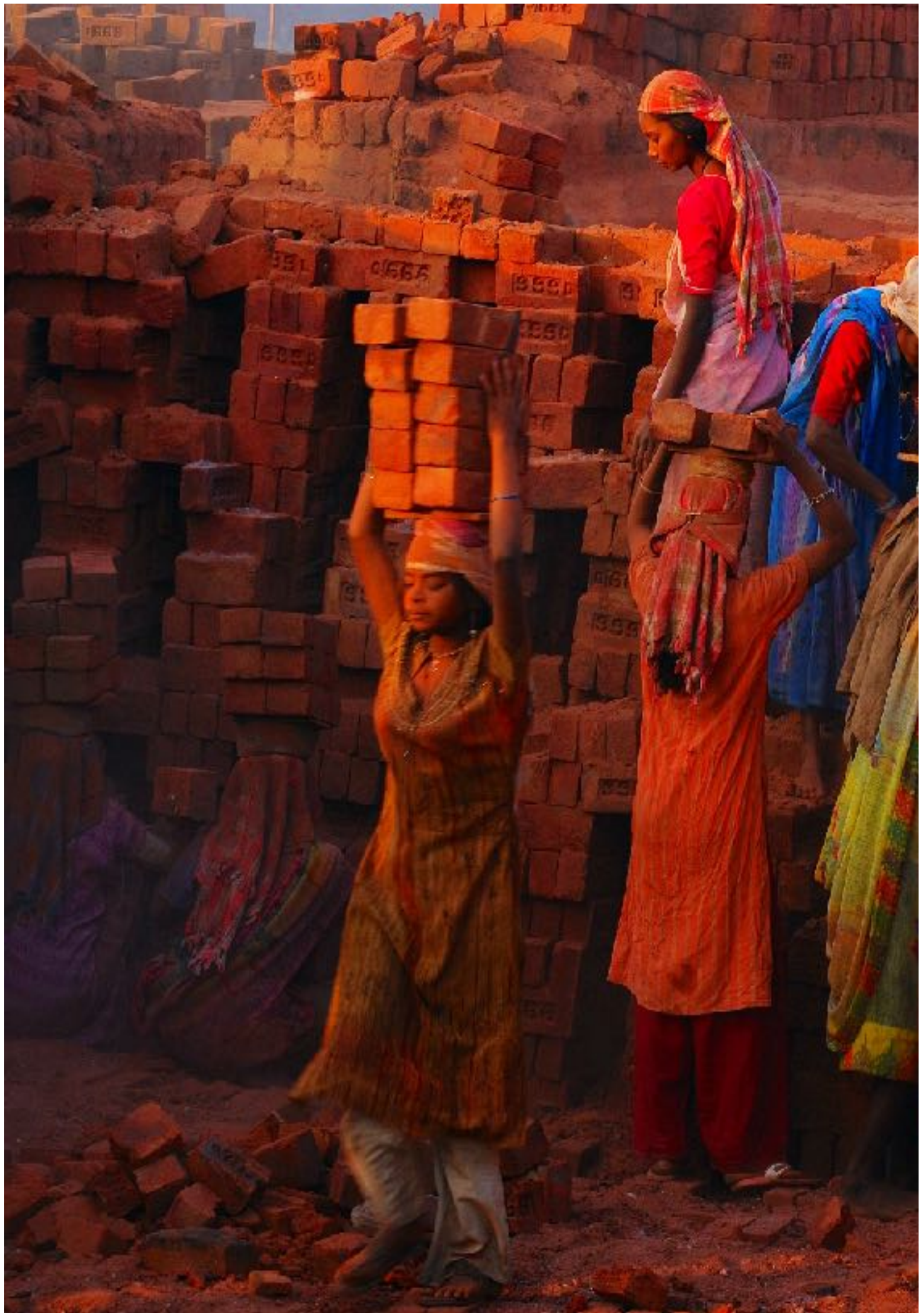

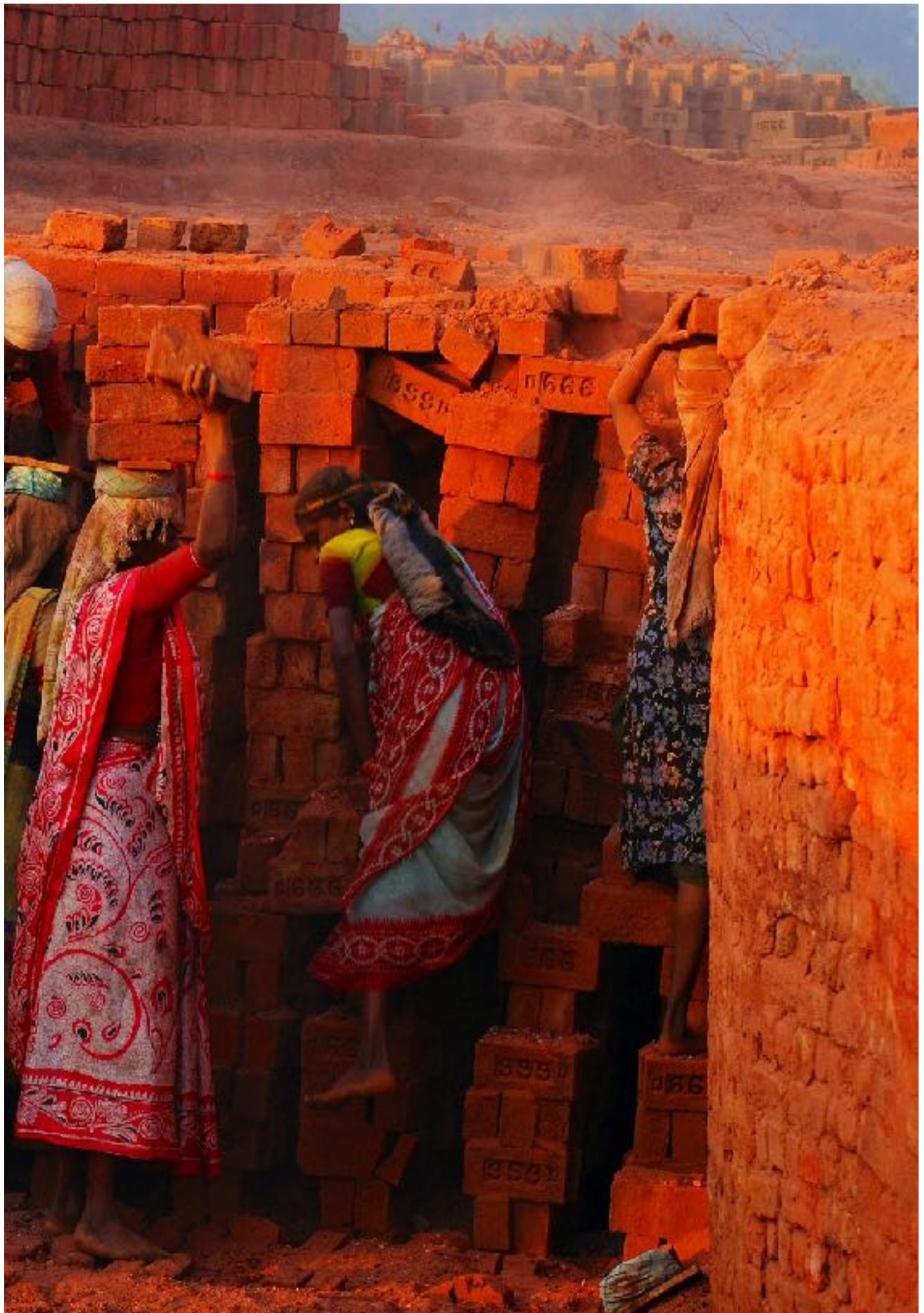

People

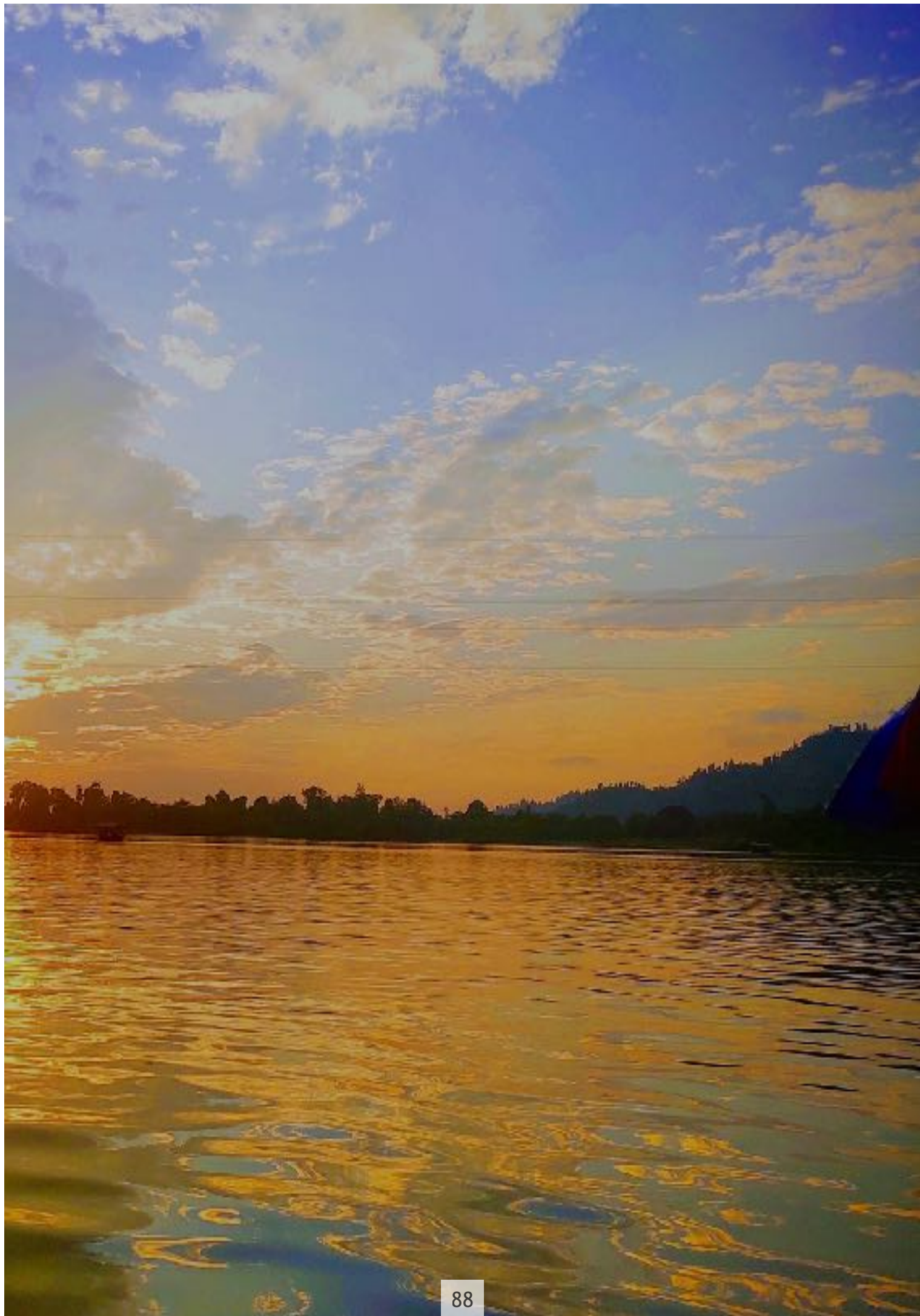
